

# Manage Your Browser Passwords

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Using a password manager program is the best way to keep track of all those pesky passwords that we need these days. But another option is to use the password manager options included in modern web browsers.

While these are reasonably secure, Firefox is the only one to let you set a master password for additional security. Also, the latest version of Firefox stores passwords in an encrypted app called Firefox Lockwise. You can download iOS and Android versions of the app to enable remote access to the stored passwords.

Here is how to view the passwords stored in several popular browsers.

## Google Chrome

### [How to Manage Saved Passwords in Chrome](#)

- Open Google Chrome Settings
- Select **Autofill > Passwords** (or enter `chrome://settings/passwords` in search bar)
- You will see a list of your saved passwords
- Click on an account to edit or delete a password
- Enter your Google account password
- Click **edit** or **delete**

## Firefox

### [Firefox – How to view saved passwords](#)

- Open Firefox
- Click on the **menu** button at the top left of the window (three horizontal lines)
- Click **Logins and Passwords**
- You will see a list of your saved passwords
- Select **edit** or **remove** as needed

## Apple Safari

### [Mac: How to view and edit passwords saved with Safari](#)

- Open Safari
- Click **Safari > Preferences**
- Click the **Passwords** tab at the top of the window, and enter your computer's password
- Click on an item to view the password, double-click the password (or user name) to edit

## Microsoft Edge

### [How to View and Manage Saved Passwords in Edge Browser | Laptop Mag](#)

- Open Edge
- Click the **menu** button in Edge and then select **Settings**
- Click the **View advanced settings** button
- Click **Managed my saved passwords**
- Click on one of the logins to edit the username or password

You can also use the Manage Web Credentials section in Windows 10 User Accounts to view and manage all your saved passwords.
